

Broad support base, individuals and organizations, local business and industry, outfitters, water companies, state federal, local gov't, landowners, conservationists, recreation, tourism –

- Florence Convention and Visitors Bureau – spearheaded the product development, marketing, and planning of the SC Revolutionary Rivers Trail and FoRevR; devotes 10 hours per week to the upkeep and promotion of the trail
- Florence County Parks and Recreation – provides meeting space, social media presence, event planning, and educational programming related to the water trail
- Florence County Council – supported a series of billboards promoting the trail, including the statue of Francis Marion at Odell Venters Landing; funded in part the statue; approved clearing of the river and assistance from the EMS department
- Department of Natural Resources – wrote and printed the Lynches Scenic River Water Trail book; attended first community meeting to ensure the transition from scenic river status to National Recreation Trail; holds river sweeps in the area; created Statewide Conservation Map for SC Conservation Bank, identifying priority conservation areas along the water trail; assisted the Scenic River Advisory Committee in developing the Lynches Scenic River Management Plan
- Florence County GIS Department – created maps of landings along the water trail, developed a web app with geolocator for committee members to log concerns or take promotional photos along the trail; trained CVB staff to be self-sufficient in making changes in GIS files
- Florence County Emergency Management Services – oversaw the clearing of the water way to ensure that no more than 6-8' was cleared from path to protect the environment and confirm that the full length of the river is navigable
- SC National Heritage Trail – developed the initial concept of SC Revolutionary Rivers for tourism product development, created branding and advertisement pieces
- SC Parks, Recreation, and Tourism – video of the water trail by Field & Stream editor, editorial coverage in the SC Vacation Guide, coordination of travel writers, Tourism Advertising Grant program which covered approximately 50% of all ad costs
- Attorneys Ben Zeigler and Helen McFadden – assisted in the legal points regarding setting up a non-profit organization and regarding the screened platform campsites; provided monetary support for the Shad Roe-Deo; coordinated food and speaker portions of the activities at the event
- Representative Roger Kirby – supported the SC Revolutionary Rivers Trail's request to be included in the SC Liberty Trail and the SC250 sesstercentennial celebrations
- Senator Hugh Leatherman - supported the SC Revolutionary Rivers Trail's request to be included in the SC Liberty Trail and the SC250 sesstercentennial celebrations
- Florence Rotary Club – granted \$1250 for purchase of inclusive kayaking equipment for handicapped paddlers
- Local fishermen – provided tours for tourism professionals into the cypress-tupelo swamplands
- Property owners – allow private land and boat landing to be used as water access, tree debris removal on the river, requested assistance from the County in clearing the river of large fallen trees (resulting in the grant from Duke Energy to complete the work), host various events on the river in coordination with Pee Dee Land Trust

- River Rat's Canoe and Kayak Rental – chairman of FoRevR organization; maintenance of screened platform campsite on his property; complimentary use of kayaks and guide service for paddling fundraisers; placement of all signage: mile markers, upcoming landing, safety, and wayfinding; acts as mediator between County and property owners; assisted in coordination of the river clearing; hosts summer camps
- Lynches River County Park – provides meeting space for community meetings, hosts numerous events related to the river, coordinates regular educational programming, hosts summer camps, assists in river sweeps, provided land for second platform campsite, social media presence
- National Park Service – provided aid through Rivers, Trails, and Conservation Assistance program to form FoRevR friends group; coordinated community meetings; provided support in applying for National Recreation Trail designation; assisted in locating funding for projects; currently assisting in creation of Master Trails Plan for Florence County
- Duke Energy – provided financial assistance to the County to clear the river
- Pee Dee Tourism Commission – provides support for outside activities; sponsor of several events, sponsor of the second screened platform
- Pee Dee Land Trust – partnered with FoRevR for Shad Roe-Deo, provided mailing list of approximately 500 donors, assisted in planning of event
- General Contractors – built the screened platform (accessible only by water) by carrying all material down river on a pontoon boat, constructed the campsite at cost
- Business owners – sponsored numerous events held by FoRevR, City of Johnsonville, and Lynches River County Park
- Pee Dee Area Area Council Boy Scouts – Eagle Scout built 30 wood duck boxes to place along the river
- Artisans – provided auction items, crafted pottery bowls similar to those in the 1700s for catfish stew at an event; provide demonstrations of weaving, woodworking, and blacksmithing at events
- Reenactors – add historical feel to events held at Odell Venters Landing
- Nan Ya Plastics Corporation – provide manpower and large tents at events
- Francis Marion Trail Commission – permit use of collection of stories, historical and legendary, regarding Francis Marion; developed three driving trail routes and installed interpretive signage; verbal support of the SC Revolutionary Rivers effort
- Sonoco Products Company – as owner of Snow Island property, provide guided tours of the area of Francis Marion's headquarters; provides upkeep of The Cut Landing which is open for public use daily, dawn to dusk, free of charge
- McCall Farms – a vegetable canning facility located on Lynches River Park, printed cards regarding Francis Marion's camp and provided 2,000 cans of peanuts and sweet potatoes for promotion of the trail
